Why you should save for something that's fun

Financial planners tend to have firm ideas about the most important goals: You should save for retirement, pay off debt and build an emergency fund. Buying a pair of \$200 sneakers or an ultra-high definition TV is probably not on that list.

But maybe saving for something you really, really want isn't frivolous. It may be exactly what you need to get your financial life on track.

Researchers who have studied the role of savings in financial health say what's important is the habit of putting aside money and having a plan for that cash. People who have a planned savings habit are four times more likely to be financially healthy than those who don't, according to a report by the nonprofit Center for Financial Services Innovation. That habit is more important than income, age or other demographic characteristics, the report found.

Saving even small amounts can help people avoid the high cost of being broke. A few hundred bucks saved may help bypass credit card debt, payday lenders, rent-to-own stores and bank overdraft fees. It can help avoid eviction, or losing a job because the car broke down. Even a thin financial cushion can help people become more financially stable.

"That ability to be resilient in the face of ups and downs is a very important component of financial health," says John Thompson, senior vice president and head of research consulting at the Center for Financial Services Innovation. "It also helps people avoid high-cost financial services when they face a short-term challenge."

But saving a small amount, only to see it wiped out by an unexpected expense, isn't satisfying. Saving up to buy something we want, on the other hand, can feel like a real win — and it's the winning that matters to our brains. Each time we anticipate getting a reward, our brains are treated to a shot of dopamine, the chemical that makes us want to repeat a pleasurable experience.

Recalling our small wins also can help us learn to persist when difficulties arise, rather than just giving up, says Michael Thomas Jr., an accredited

Local hoteliers open Tippy Rooster bar and liquor store at Southwinds

The southern end of Simonton Street houses nearly a thousand hotel rooms.

There's also a convenience store, sandwich shop, French cafes, rental scooters, upscale restaurants and watersports.

But something was missing.

"This area of town, surrounded by almost 1,000 hotel rooms, was lacking a place where folks could chill out and have a drink, and also pick up a bottle of wine or liquor to take back to their hotel room, or to take home after work," said Marc Meisel, CEO of Meisel Holdings, the family-run company that owns and operates Santa Maria Suites, Southwinds Motel and H2O Suites in that neighborhood. "Although

many of the hotels in the immediate area serve alcohol at their own bars, there isn't anywhere really close by to buy a bottle to take with you."

There is now. The Tippy Rooster opened less than a week ago, and is already a visibly popular addition to the Old Town neighborhood. Half outdoor beach bar with a sand floor and umbrella-shaded tables overlooking Simonton Street, and half spotlessly clean liquor store, the little space is becoming a big part of the neighborhood.

Meisel and his staff opened The Tippy Rooster on Monday, Jan. 8, and were completely — and wonderfully — surprised by the immediate embrace it received from hotel guests — some from the attached Southwinds Motel and others from nearby properties — as well as local residents who either live or work in the neighborhood.

"In fact, we've been staying open later than we had initially planned, because people have been enjoying themselves until 11 p.m., so we stayed," Meisel said on Thursday, thrilled with the response it's received. "We set out to create something different inside and out. Typically liquor stores are perfunctory, dark and not inviting. We wanted to create a liquor store that also had style; one where everyone would feel comfortable shopping."

Elegant wood shelves are neatly stocked with bottles and lined with thick, nautical rope. A large service window for the outside bar provides abundant sunlight that brightens any interior. Friendly bartenders chat easily with store customers and bar patrons, who sit outside in

Foundation's Hurricane Irma relief fund tops \$1M in grants

MONROE COUNTY — The Community Foundation of the Florida Keys has now provided more than \$1 million to assist with relief and recovery efforts in the Keys following Hurricane Irma.

To date, including a new round of grants, CFFK has distributed over \$1 million in grants to more than 75 local nonprofit organizations from the Florida Keys Emergency Relief Fund and the Landau Family Hurricane Relief Fund for the Upper Keys to support recovery and rebuilding for thousands of individuals from Key West to Key Largo.

The latest round of grants

totaling nearly \$400,000 supports 36 nonprofits providing direct assistance to children, families, those who lost their homes, firefighters, workers in the tourism industry, special needs populations, and others in need throughout the Keys.

Four advisory committees representing areas of the Keys review all applications to determine how to best meet the local area's needs. The committees made recommendations to CFFK's grants committee for final determination.

Grant beneficiaries:

- A Positive Step of Monroe County, \$10,000 to support low-income fathers ages 16 to 24 and their families.
- Autism Society of the Keys, \$1,000 to meet critical needs of families and children with autism.
- Boys & Girls Clubs of the Keys Area, \$21,000 to meet transportation needs.
- Child Care Aware of America, \$9,000 to rebuild childcare programs with safe tools and resources.
- Early Childhood Initiative Foundation of Miami-Dade/Monroe, \$15,000 to help repair childcare centers.
- Fair Insurance Rates in Monroe (FIRM), \$750 to produce a "Hurricane Insurance

Claims and Recovery Resource Guide."
